perpetuate the cycle of poverty and social marginalization FAQs 1 Isnt American Apartheid an overly dramatic term The term apartheid is used deliberately to highlight the systemic nature of racial discrimination and its impact on the lives of Black Americans While not an explicit system of legal segregation like in South Africa the lasting effects of past discrimination and current systemic inequalities are analogous to an apartheid system 2 Isnt it more about individual choices and personal responsibility While individual choices play a role the argument here is that the conditions created by systemic racism and societal structures make it much more difficult for Black Americans to achieve upward mobility The systems are designed to keep them in place 3 What can I do to make a difference There are many ways to contribute to dismantling systemic racism and creating a more just society Support organizations fighting for racial justice educate yourself and others about the realities of racial inequality advocate for policies that address systemic issues and challenge racist assumptions and stereotypes in your own life 4 Isnt affirmative action the solution While affirmative action can be a valuable tool for addressing historical inequities it is not a magic bullet It is only one part of a larger solution that requires a comprehensive approach to dismantling the systems that perpetuate racial inequality 5 Isnt the United States becoming more racially diverse Yes the US is becoming more diverse but this does not negate the continued existence of racial disparities and systemic racism Diversity itself does not guarantee equality or justice and the fight for racial equity continues to be a critical societal challenge 3

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at century s close american social scientists policy analysts philanthropists and politicians became obsessed with a fearsome and mysterious new group said to be ravaging the ghetto the urban underclass soon the scarecrow category and its demonic imagery were exported to the united kingdom and continental europe and agitated the international study of exclusion in the postindustrial metropolis in this punchy book loïc wacquant retraces the invention and metamorphoses of this racialized folk devil from the structural conception of swedish economist gunnar myrdal to the behavioral notion of washington think tank experts to the neo ecological formulation of sociologist william julius wilson he uncovers the springs of the sudden irruption accelerated circulation and abrupt evaporation of the underclass from public debate and reflects on the implications for the social epistemology of urban marginality what accounts for the lemming effect that drew a generation of scholars of race and poverty over a scientific cliff what are the conditions for the formation and bursting of conceptual speculative bubbles what is the role of think tanks journalism and politics in imposing turnkey problematics upon social researchers what are the special quandaries posed by the naming of dispossessed and dishonored populations in scientific discourse and how can we reformulate the explosive question of race to avoid these troubles answering these questions constitutes an exacting exercise in epistemic reflexivity in the tradition of bachelard canguilhem and bourdieu and it issues in a clarion call for social scientists to defend their intellectual autonomy against the encroachments of outside powers be they state officials the media think tanks or philanthropic organizations compact meticulous and forcefully argued this study in the politics of social science knowledge will be of great interest to students and scholars in sociology anthropology urban studies ethnic studies geography intellectual history the philosophy of science and public policy

the acclaimed author and new yorker columnist delves into the core of american poverty in the early 1980s invaluable the washington post first appearing as a three part series in the new yorker ken auletta s the underclass provides an enlightening look at the lives of addicts dropouts ex convicts welfare recipients and individuals experiencing homelessness auletta s investigation began with a seemingly simple goal to find out who exactly makes up the poorest of the poor and to trace the many paths that took them there as the author follows 250 hardened members of this underclass he focuses on efforts to help them reconstruct their lives and find a functional place in mainstream society through the lives of the men and women he encounters auletta discovers the complex truths that have made hard core poverty in america such an intractable problem in a nation where poverty and welfare rolls are declining but the underclass persists the united states is as conflicted as ever about its responsibilities toward all its people with his empathy insight and expert reportage auletta s the

debates about the family and single parenthood about crime and about unemployment and welfare reform have all become embroiled in underclass theories this volume explores the underclass idea in relation to contemporary youth

who are those at the bottom of society there has been much discussion in recent years on both left and right about the existence of an alleged underclass in both britain and the usa it has been claimed this group lives outside the mainstream of society is characterised by crime suffers from long term unemployment and single parenthood and is alienated from its core values in underclass john welshman shows that there have always been concerns about an underclass whether constructed as the social residuum of the 1880s the problem family of the 1950s or the cycle of deprivation of the 1970s there are marked differences between these concepts but also striking continuities indeed a concern with an underclass has in many ways been as long as an interest in poverty itself this book is the first to look systematically at the question providing new insights on contemporary debates about behaviour poverty and welfare reform

political correctness idealizing the oppressed and an affinity for authoritarian and charismatic leaders are all parts of what ellis calls the dark side of the left

deindustrialization white flight and inner city poverty have spelled trouble for baltimore schools marion orr now examines why school reform has been difficult to achieve there revealing the struggles of civic leaders and the limitations placed on baltimore s african american community as each has tried to rescue a failing school system examining the interplay between government and society orr presents the first systematic analysis of social capital both within the african american community black social capital and outside it where social capital crosses racial lines orr shows that while black social capital may have created solidarity against white domination in baltimore it hampered african american leaders capacity to enlist the cooperation from white corporate elites and suburban residents needed for school reform orr examines social capital at the neighborhood level in elite level interactions and in intergovernmental relations to argue that black social capital doesn t necessarily translate into the kind of intergroup coalition needed to bring about school reform he also includes an extensive historical survey of the black community showing how distrust engendered by past black experiences has hampered the formation of significant intergroup social capital the book features case studies of school reform activity including the first analysis of the politics surrounding baltimore s decision to

hire a private for profit firm to operate nine of its public schools these cases illuminate the paradoxical aspects of black social capital in citywide school reform while offering critical perspectives on current debates about privatization site based management and other reform alternatives orr s book challenges those who argue that social capital alone can solve fundamentally political problems by purely social means and questions the efficacy of either privatization or black community power to reform urban schools black social capital offers a cogent conceptual synthesis of social capital theory and urban regime theory that demonstrates the importance of government politics and leadership in converting social capital into a resource that can be mobilized for effective social change

analyzes the problematic trends facing america s cities and older suburbs and challenges us to put america s urban crisis back on the national agenda

here is a through assessment of the development of the university of kansas during its first century clifford s griffin traces the university from little more than a high school or preparatory school to a college and then to a major institution no mere chronicle of the university s triumphs and progress this book gives equal attention to the many disappointments and frustrations over the years griffin concerns himself not only with the physical growth of the institution but with the nature of the university s goals and character as well from john fraser to w clarke wescoe each chancellor of the university of kansas faced unique problems in shaping the destiny of the ever expanding institution they struggled with the perils of an unstable economy enrollment crises departmentalization disagreements with faculty and regents disputes over open admission and the importance of scholarly research demands for higher salaries and alteration of the curriculum and even grasshopper plagues each administration competed for legislative appropriations status and public support anyone who has been associated with the university will find in this history many of the things he remembers best its social organizations athletic contests student pranks class feuds and campus politics colorful mount oread personalities are described leaders scholars politicians and benefactors thirty six photographs trace different phases of the university s growth even those individuals well informed concerning the history of the university will learn much about its past and its potential for the future in addition griffin explores ideas about the purposes and practices of higher education including the concept of the american state university as a servant of society in many respects the development of the university paralleled the growth of the state itself this book is therefore a valuable contribution to the cultural and intellectual history of the nineteenth and twentieth centuries in kansas

the voting rights act of 1965 which originally was intended to prohibit barriers to black registration and voting has been hailed as a triumph for civil rights and as a catalyst for the election of minorities to public office in both the deep south and the urban north to advance its objective federal courts instructed many cities to change from at large to

single member district electoral systems as a way to ensure that minorities had a reasonable chance to elect representatives of their choice in the first book to critique the implementation of this landmark legislation in a major american city ruth morgan examines its effect on local governance over forty years in dallas and shows that it had unintended consequences for racial politics representation and public policy breaking from studies that measure the success of the vra in terms of increased minority representation morgan assesses the consequences of the act for dallas city government and for the wider interests of minorities as well while endorsing the original intent of the vra morgan believes that this intent was subverted by subsequent amendments to the act and by the courts attempts to advance the political standing of particular minority groups she argues that court imposed single member districts have created in dallas a city council infected with parochialism and careerism a result of members no longer having to compromise to win citywide votes and have had an adverse impact on governmental effectiveness and voter turnout with corruption and cronyism now rampant voting rights legislation and litigation have ultimately failed to fulfill the hopes and aspirations of the unempowered and the district system has created an incentive for continued racial separation governance by decree offers a pointed assessment of the complexities and contradictions produced by the voting rights law while at the same time calling for the federal judiciary to exercise restraint in imposing its will when it lacks the capacity to make choices that are inherently political morgan s powerfully argued case study should inspire much debate and inform forthcoming congressional deliberations over the renewal of the preclearance section of the vra in 2007

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few american social programs have been more unpopular controversial or costly than aid to families with dependent children afdc its budget now in the tens of billions of dollars has become a prominent target for welfare reformers and outraged citizens indeed if public opinion ruled afdc would be discarded entirely and replaced with employment yet it persists steven teles s provocative study reveals why and tells us what we should do about it teles argues that over the last thirty years political debate

on afdc has been dominated by an impasse created by what he calls ideological dissensus an enduring conflict between opposing cultural elites that have largely disregarded public opinion thus he contends one must examine the origins and persistence of elite conflict in order to fully comprehend afdc s immunity to the reform it truly needs the kind that unites the elements of order equality and individualism central to the american creed one of the first studies to analyze afdc from a new democrat position whose welfare sheds new light on the controversial role of the courts in afdc the rise of welfare waivers in the mid 1980s the failure of the clinton welfare plan and the victory of block granting over policy oriented welfare reform teles however goes beyond mere critical analysis to advocate specific approaches to reform his thoughtful call for compromise built around the centrality of work individual responsibility and opportunity offers a means for dissolving dissensus and genuine hope for changing an outdated and ineffectual welfare system based on interviews with participants in the afdc policymaking process as well as an unparalleled synthesis of the voluminous afdc literature whose welfare will appeal to a wide array of welfare scholars policymakers and citizens eager to better understand the tumultuous history of this problematic program and how it might fare in the wake of the fall elections

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
