traditionally wordsworth's greatness is founded on his identity as the poet of nature and solitude the wordsworthian imagination is seen as an essentially private faculty its very existence premised on the absence of other people in this title first published in 1987 david simpson challenges this established view of wordsworth arguing that it fails to recognize and explain the importance of the context of the public sphere and the social environment to the authentic experience of the imagination wordsworth's preoccupation with the metaphors of property and labour shows him to be acutely anxious about the value of his art in a world that he regarded as corrupted through close examination of a few important poems both well known and relatively unknown simpson shows that there is no unitary public wordsworth nor is there a conflict or tension between the private and the public the absence of any clear kind of authority in the voice that speaks the poems makes wordsworth's poetry in simpson's phrase a poetry of displacement

diaspora constitutes a powerful descriptor for the modern condition of the contemporary poet the spokesperson for the psyche of america the poems in american diaspora poetry of displacement focus on the struggles and pleasures of creating a home physical and mental out of displacement exile migration and alienation to fully explore the concept of diaspora the editors have broadened the scope of their definition to include not only the physical act of moving and immigration but also the spiritual and emotional dislocations that can occur as for emily dickinson and other poets even in a life spent entirely in one location more than one hundred and thirty contemporary poets reflect and mediate rage and bless as they tell their own stories in short this is an anthology of american poetry that draws upon the sensitivity tenderness rebelliousness patience and spirituality that point to the future of our nation

the paradigmatic figure of twentieth century history is the displaced person a concept which emerged from the demographic migrations deportations and genocidal purges that accompanied two world wars the destruction and construction of nation states and the

restructuring of the global order which they occasioned these processes almost inevitably fostered a poetry of exile and expatriation intimately bound up with the experience of modernity and the culture of modernism culminating in the postcolonial era with the globalisation of displacement as the determining condition of postmodernity in this timely new volume renowned poetry critic stan smith examines a number of poets plath larkin heaney walcott middleton fisher duffy through the lens of displacement

poems inspire our trust argues james longenbach in this bracing work because they don't necessarily ask to be trusted theirs is the language of self-questioning metaphors that turn against themselves syntax that moves one way because it threatens to move another poems resist themselves more strenuously than they are resisted by the cultures receiving them but the resistance to poetry is quite specifically the wonder of poetry considering a wide array of poets from virgil and milton to dickinson and glück longenbach suggests that poems convey knowledge only inasmuch as they refuse to be vehicles for the efficient transmission of knowledge in fact this self-resistance is the source of the reader's pleasure we read poetry not to escape difficulty but to embrace it an astute writer and critic of poems longenbach makes his case through a sustained engagement with the language of poetry each chapter brings a fresh perspective to a crucial aspect of poetry line syntax figurative language voice disjunction and shows that the power of poetry depends less on meaning than on the way in which it means on the temporal process we negotiate in the act of reading or writing a poem readers and writers who embrace that process longenbach asserts inevitably recoil from the exaggeration of the cultural power of poetry in full awareness that to inflate a poem's claim on our attention is to weaken it a graceful and skilled study the resistance to poetry honors poetry by allowing it to be what it is this book arrives at a critical moment at a time when many people are trying to mold and market poetry into something it is not

this book is a refreshing and innovative reading of dennis brutus poetry underlining its concern for suffering humanity in the apartheid context and beyond through a cogent critical analysis of the poetry from a multifaceted perspective the work brings to the fore

the different motifs strategies and artistry with which brutus succeeds in initiating revolt through art it explains how the poet's engagement with the poetics of place apartheid laws police brutality questions of travel and language foregrounds these as tropes or metaphors for reinforcing the despicable apartheid image and influencing popular revolt against the system

through discussion of the ways in which major northern irish poets such as john hewitt seamus heaney michael longley louis macneice and derek mahon have been influenced by america this study shows how northern irish poetry overflows national borders complicating and enriching itself through cross cultural interaction and hybridity

in recent years new historicists have situated the iconoclasm of milton's poetry and prose within the context of political cultural and philosophical discourses that foreshadow early modernism in carnal rhetoric lana cable carries these investigations further by exploring the iconoclastic impulse in milton's works through detailed analyses of his use of metaphor building on a provocative iconoclastic theory of metaphor she breaks new ground in the area of affective stylistics not only as it pertains to the writings of milton but also to all expressive language cable traces the development of milton's iconoclastic poetics from its roots in the antiprelatical tracts through the divorce tracts and areopagitica to its fullest dramatic representation in eikonoklastes and samson agonistes arguing that like every creative act metaphor is by nature a radical and self transgressing agent of change she explores the site where metaphoric language and imaginative desire merge examining the demands milton places on metaphor particularly his emphasis on language as a vehicle for mortal redemption cable demonstrates the ways in which metaphor acts for him as that creative and radical agent of change in the process she reveals milton's engagement at the deepest levels of linguistic creativity with the early modern commitment to an imaginative and historic remaking of the world an insightful and synthetic book carnal rhetoric will

appeal to scholars of english literature milton and the renaissance as well as to those with an interest in the theory of affective stylistics as it pertains to reader response criticism semantics epistemology and the philosophy and psychology of language

jorie graham is one of the most important american poets now writing this first book length study brings together thirteen previously published essays and review essays by many of the major critics currently interested in her work and five new essays commissioned for this volume commenting on each of graham s eight poetry collections these essays encompass the range of critical thought that her work has attracted both surveying it broadly and engaging closely with individual poems these essays identify three broad concerns that run through each of her strikingly different volumes of poems the movement of the mind in action the role of the body in experiencing the world and the pressures of material conditions on mind and body alike gardner both shows how graham is being read at the moment and charts new areas of investigation likely to dominate thinking about her over the next decade this collection is sure to become the crucial first step for all future work on graham and on american poetry of the last two decades

as the first major book length study of the poetry of derek mahon this volume of fourteen essays represents a long overdue account and assessment of one of the foremost living english language poets in considering the central issues of mahon s poetry the relation between poetry and politics the conflicting claims of art and nature the representation of gender the importance of place the poet s response to violence and his characteristic techniques of displacement ambiguity and intertextuality these essays also represent a variety of critical approaches to the poetry

in this thought provoking volume fifteen well known scholars from the u s and europe focus

on the current state of the interpretation of roman poetry and on its future tasks among the timely subjects they discuss is the role of theory genre and historicism and the survival of the new criticism the strengths and limitations of a variety of approaches are considered debated and illustrated with the interpretation of specific examples from roman poetry a recurring theme is the need for increased methodological reflection the introduction assesses the present state of the interpretation of roman poetry on the contemporary scene of literary criticism contributors include g b conte charles segal francis cairns jasper griffin michael von albrecht and w r johnson

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
