the goal of perspectives on student affairs in south africa is to generate interest in student affairs in south africa the papers contained herein are based on best practice local experience and well researched international and local theories the papers in this book deal with matters pertaining to international and national trends in student affairs academic development access and retention counseling and material support for students coming from disadvantaged backgrounds they are linked to national and international developments as described in the first two papers this publication will assist both young and experienced practitioners as they grow into their task of developing the students entrusted to them all contributors are south africans with a great deal of experience in student affairs and all are committed to the advancement of student affairs in south africa the editors are former heads of student affairs portfolios at two leading south african universities

the lived experiences of students educational practices are analysed and explained in terms of the book s plea for the recognition of the multi dimentionality of students as educational beings with unexplored cultural wealth and hidden capitals the book presents an argument that student lives are entangled in complex social spatial relations and processes that extend across family neighbourhood and peer associations which are largely misrecognised in educational policy and practice the book is relevant to understanding the role of policy curriculum and pedagogy in addressing the educational performance of working class youth

black student politics higher education and apartheid examines two black national student political organisations the south african national students congress sansco and the south african students organisation saso popularly associated with black consciousness it analyses the ideologies politics and organisation of saso and sansco and their intellectual political and social determinants it also analyses their role in the educational political and social spheres and the factors that shaped their activities finally it assesses their contributions to the popular struggle against apartheid education as

well as against race class and gender oppression

this book examines student mobility within africa international student mobility is among the central activities of higher education internationalization as the number of international students increase so do the destinations in both number and geographic diversity historically international student mobility has followed south north and north north patterns however recent literature show the growth in north south and south south patterns of student mobility there has also been a rise in regional mobility in what is referred to in the book as intra africa mobility the books explores and analyzes the patterns of intra africa mobility based on seven african countries south africa kenya uganda nigeria ghana senegal and egypt the editors and contributors addressthree central research questions why did the students choose the country they are studying in why did they choose the institution they are studying in what are their academic and social experiences in these countries and their respective institutions this book is the first comprehensive exploration of intra africa student mobility in a field that traditionally centers on the global north

this book explores anti apartheid movements on university and college campuses across africa and the united states in the 1970s and 1980s in the wake of the march 1960 sharpeville massacre in south africa the country's apartheid policies drew increasing critical international attention by the 1970s south africa found itself isolated due to growing sporting economic and cultural boycotts africans across the continent showed solidarity with black south africans through a range of boycotts and protests by hosting south africans exiled from their home country and by vilifying the apartheid government at every turn this volume looks at elite institutions as well as state colleges and universities in the united states and the actions of university students in nigeria kenya ghana and south africa during the anti apartheid movements in the 1970s and 1980s revealing the local manifestations of a global struggle the chapters showcase how vibrant campus anti apartheid movements were what universal problems emerged and where unique concerns

manifested at a wide range of institutions taking innovative approaches and offering case studies struggle for a free south africa reveals the myriad ways the anti apartheid struggle manifested in a range of academic environments and how those campaigns have been remembered and documented this book was originally published as a special issue of safundi
