this book reviews progress and describes original research in the cognitive psychology of the arts the invited contributors are leading authorities and the topics which they cover include psychological approaches to symbols and meaning in art issues in experimental aesthetics the development in children of artistic production and appreciation and the perception of musical and pictorial material

other qualities that make us human are determined by our place in history and more particularly by our culture and language margolis rejects the idea that any concepts or truths remain fixed and objective through the flow of history and reveals that this theory of the human being or philosophical anthropology as culturally determined and changing is necessary to make sense of art he shows that a painting sculpture or poem cannot have a single correct interpretation because our creation and perception of art will always be mitigated by our historical and cultural contexts calling upon philosophers ranging from parmenides and plato to kant hegel and wittgenstein art historians from damisch to elkins artists from van eyck to michelangelo to wordsworth to duchamp margolis creates a philosophy of art interwoven with his philosophical anthropology which pointedly challenges prevailing views of the fine arts and the nature of personhood

arnheim gestalt and art is the first book length discussion of the powerful thinking of the psychologist of art rudolf arnheim written as a complete overview of arnheim s thinking it covers fundamental issues of the importance of psychological discussion of the arts the status of gestalt psychology the various sense modalities and media and developmental issues by proceeding in a direction from general to specific and then proceeding through dynamic processes as they unfold in time creativity development etc the book discovers an unappreciated unity to arnheim s thinking not content to simply summarize arnheim s theory however arnheim art and gestalt goes on to enrich and occasionally question arnheim s findings with the contemporary results of gestalt theoretical research from around the world but especially in italy and germany the result is a workable overview of the psychology of art with bridges built to contemporary research making arnheim s approach living and sustainable

a complex and fascinating question is why do humans have such strong emotional reactions and human connections to art why do viewers become scared even haunted for days by a movie monster they know doesn t exist why do humans

become enthralled by distorted figures and scenes that aren't realistic why do viewers have emotional attachments to comic book characters the answer lies in that while humans know art is human made artifice they view and decipher art using the same often nonconscious methods that they use to view and decipher reality looking at how we perceive reality shows us how we perceive art and looking at how we perceive art helps show us how we perceive reality written by the prominent art historian and philosopher cyril k. stein this book is a concise introduction to understanding art perception covering key psychological cognitive science physiological and philosophical concepts

drawing together the estrangement theories of viktor shklovsky and bertolt brecht with leo tolstoy's theory of infection douglas robinson studies the ways in which shared evaluative affect regulates both literary familiarity convention and tradition and modern strategies of alienation depersonalization and malaise this book begins with two assumptions both taken from tolstoy's late aesthetic treatise what is art 1898 that there is a malaise in culture and that literature's power to infect readers with the moral values of the author is a possible cure for this malaise exploring these ideas of estrangement within the contexts of earlier contemporary and later critical theory robinson argues that shklovsky and brecht follow tolstoy in their efforts to fight depersonalization by imbuing readers with the transformative guidance of collectivized feeling robinson's somatic approach to literature offers a powerful alternative to depersonalizing structuralist and poststructuralist theorization without simply retreating into conservative rejection and reaction both a comparative study of russian and german literary theoretical history and an insightful examination of the somatics of literature this groundbreaking work provides a deeper understanding of how literature affects the reader and offers a new perspective on present day problems in poststructuralist approaches to the human condition

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
