

# Ethics In Palliative Care A Complete Guide

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series editors moira stewart judith belle brown and thomas r freeman as the population in western cultures ages more people suffer chronic ultimately life limiting diseases and medical professionals need to be equipped to cope with the ever growing pressure of palliative care this book gives guidance on how to approach patients with life limiting illness while the problems most people present to the doctor appear relatively straightforward a whole person approach to

understanding the complex interaction between the person their illness and their environment should lead to a more complete consideration of the illness and better health outcomes for issues of palliative care such an approach is essential to identify and meet the many needs of desperately ill people palliative care offers a fresh look at the management of patients with international evidence based contributions the book suggests practical and challenging ways to care for the dying it is ideal for all healthcare professionals working in palliative care general practitioners and medicine and healthcare students

a clinical case based handbook has a role in general clinicians practice of caring for patients with serious or life limiting illness the explosion of the field of hospice and palliative medicine impacts all physicians and healthcare providers fellowship trained specialists graduate in greater numbers annually these and more seasoned specialists are now certified by the american board of medical specialties as subspecialists research in this field is expanding in scope and quantity and peer reviewed journals devoted to this work are multiplying moreover peer reviewed journals in primary care and other subspecialties of medicine regularly include papers that focus on end of life care quality of life issues and symptom management overall then access to clinical information necessary to care for patients with life limiting illness is not only essential but also increasingly available this case based clinical book aims to help with the actual practice of caring for patients with life limiting illness numerous texts and journals exist to provide the data to inform care yet there remains a need to find practical points and information about the practical application of the principles of palliative care thus we hope that the cases key points and practical tips will help health care providers who are not experts already in palliative care in the care of patients with serious illness and challenging problems some chapters follow one patient through the course of an illness to highlight the applicability of palliative care throughout the disease process

this book encourages health professionals to reconceptualise their practice in the light of the fact that their patients are deteriorating and dying supporting them in their dichotomous role which involves affirming that person's life whilst acknowledging that that life is ending professionals are encouraged to think laterally to be creative in their use of their core skills and to use their life skills and experience to change the focus of their interventions by making these changes those involved with caring for the dying will be able to address issues related to burnout and feeling de-skilled the authors share their considerable experience with the reader what works for both patient and carer professional when working in this field by providing workable solutions they empower those in disempowering situations such as when working with terminally ill children and adults the book is truly holistic and client centred in its approach upholding the philosophy of palliative care aimed at all who interact with children and adults who have a life limiting condition or who are dying offers practical examples of approaches to dilemmas and emotional issues commonly face by those working in palliative care encourages professionals to think laterally to be creative in their use of core skills and to use their life skills and experience to change the focus of their interventions moves the emphasis away from the medical model to the emotional and spiritual influences on quality of life offers clear workable guidelines and demonstrates practical solutions based on proven theory and experience to problems encountered on a day to day basis by patients and those coming into contact with them

death dying loss and care giving are not just medical issues but societal ones palliative care has become increasingly professionalised focused around symptom science with this emphasis on minimizing the harms of physical psychological and spiritual stress there has been a loss of how cultures and communities look after their dying with the wider social experience of death often sidelined in the professionalisation and medicalisation of care however the people we know and love in the places we know and love make up what matters most for those undergoing the experiences of death loss and care giving over the last 25 years the theory practice research evidence base and clinical applications have developed generating widespread adoption of the principles of public health approaches to palliative care the essential principles of prevention harm reduction early intervention and health and wellbeing promotion can be applied to the universal experience of end of life irrespective of disease or diagnosis compassionate communities have become a routine part of the strategy and service development in palliative care both within the uk and internationally the oxford textbook of public health palliative care provides a reframing of palliative care bringing together the full scope of theory practice and evidence into one volume written by international leaders in the field it provides the first truly comprehensive and authoritative textbook on the subject that will help to further inform developments in this growing specialty

palliative care refers to the medical and nursing care meant for people struggling with life limiting illnesses it aims at controlling symptoms reducing pain and providing relief in physical and mental stress at any stage of illness it focuses on improving the quality of life for the patient as well as their family the health professionals commonly involved in a palliative care team include nurses physicians occupational therapists physiotherapists and speech language pathologists edmonton symptoms assessment scale esas is a common method used to assess the symptoms of the patients receiving palliative care the book studies analyzes and upholds the pillars of palliative care and its utmost significance in modern times it aims to shed light on some of the unexplored aspects of palliative care and the recent researches in the subject this book includes contributions of experts and researchers which will provide innovative insights into this field

current projections indicate that by 2050 the number of people aged over 80 years old will rise to 395 million and that by this date 25 30 of people over the age of 85 will show some degree of cognitive decline palliative care for older people a public health perspective provides a comprehensive account of the current state of palliative care for older people worldwide and illustrates the range of concomitant issues that as the global population ages will ever more acutely shape the decisions of policy makers and care givers the book begins by outlining the range of policies towards palliative care for older people that are found worldwide it follows this by examining an array of socio cultural issues and palliative care initiatives from the care implications of health trajectories of older people to the spiritual requirements of palliative care patients and from the need to encourage compassion towards end of life care within communities to the development of care pathways for older people palliative care for older people a public health perspective is a valuable resource for professionals and academics in a range of healthcare and public health fields to understand the current state of policy work from around the world the book also highlights the social cultural considerations that influence the difficult decisions that those involved in palliative care face not least patients
