textbook offers an exceptional foundation to the field for those who are coming to it for the first time provides an ideal first course book in phonology written by a renowned phonologist developed and tested in the classroom through years of experience and use emphasizes analysis of phonological data placing this in its scientific context and explains the relevant methodology guides students through the larger questions of what phonological patterns reveal about language includes numerous course friendly features including multi part exercises and annotated suggestions for further reading at the end of each chapter

this collection of papers deals with the inter relatedness of syntax and phonology and more generally with the issue of interaction among the components of linguistic structure

phonetically based phonology is centred around the hypothesis that phonologies of languages are determined by phonetic principles that is phonetic patterns involving ease of articulation and perception are expressed linguistically as grammatical constraints this book brings together a team of scholars to provide a wide ranging study of phonetically based phonology it investigates the role of phonetics in many phonological phenomena such as assimilation vowel reduction vowel harmony syllable weight contour line distribution metathesis lenition sonority sequencing and the obligatory contour principle ocp exploring in particular the phonetic bases of phonological markedness in these key

areas the analyses also illustrate several analytical strategies whereby phonological sound patterns can be related to their phonological underpinnings each chapter includes a tutorial discussion of the phonetics on which the phonological discussion is based diverse and comprehensive in its coverage phonetically based phonology will be welcomed by all linguists interested in the relationship between phonetics and phonological theory

in recent years an increasing number of linguists have re examined the question of whether markedness has explanatory power or whether it is a phenomenon that begs explanation itself this volume brings together a collection of articles with a broad range of critical viewpoints on the notion of markedness in phonological theory the contributions span a variety of phonological frameworks and relate to morphosyntax historical linguistics neurolinguistics biolinguistics and language typology this volume will be of particular interest to phonologists of both synchronic and diachronic persuasions and has strong implications for the architecture of grammar with respect to phonology and its interfaces with morphosyntax and phonetics

main description this book brings together researchers from sociolinguistics phonetics and phonology and provides an overview of current issues in variation and gradience in phonetics and phonology in this book variation at every level of phonological representation is addressed it contributes to the growing interest in gradience and variation in theoretical phonology by combining research on the factors underlying variability and systematic quantitative results with theoretical phonological considerations

the papers in this tightly focused collection all report recent research on aspects of rendaku sequential voicing the well known morphophonemic phenomenon in japanese that affects initial consonants of non initial elements in complex words mostly compounds the papers include broad surveys of theoretical analyses and of psycholinguistic studies meticulous assessments some relying on a new database of many of the factors that putatively inhibit or promote rendaku an investigation of how learners of japanese as foreign language deal with rendaku in depth examinations of rendaku in a divergent dialect of japanese and in a ryukyuan language and a cross linguistic exploration of

rendaku like compound markers in unrelated languages since rendaku is ubiquitous but recalcitrantly irregular it provides a challenge for any general theory of morphophonology this collection should serve both to restrain oversimplified accounts of rendaku and to inspire to further research

this volume contains 52 of the 59 papers from the 27th west coast conference on formal linguistics wccfl 27 which was held at the university of california los angeles on may 16 18 2008 the authors present new work in syntax semantics morphology and phonology the proceedings includes eliott moreton s plenary paper modelling modularity bias in phonological pattern learning
