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this book is based on the results of research in language typology and motivated by the need for a theory to explain them the essence of the approach is a that almost all aspects of grammatical structure are language specific and b that language universals are to be found in conceptual structure and in the mapping of conceptual structure on to linguistic form it proposes intimate links between syntactic and semantic structures and argues that the basic elements of any language are not syntactic but syntactic semantic gestalts professor croft puts forward a new approach to syntactic representation and a new model of how language and languages work he covers a wide range of syntactic phenomena illustrating these with examples that show the varied grammatical structures of the world s languages the book will be accessible all linguists at graduate level and beyond

the fields of syntactic theory and syntax analysis syntax can look back to a long tradition especially in the last 50 years however the interaction between syntactic theory and syntactic analysis has led to a rapid increase in analyses and theoretical suggestions this second edition of the handbook on syntax adopts a unifying perspective and therefore does not place the division of syntactic theory into several schools to the fore but the increase in knowledge resulting from the fruitful argumentations between syntactic analysis and syntactic theory it uses selected phenomena of individual languages and their cross linguistic realizations to explain what syntactic analyses can do and at the same time to show in what respects syntactic theories differ from each other it investigates how syntax is related to neighbouring disciplines and investigate the role of the interfaces especially the relationship between syntax and phonology morphology compositional semantics pragmatics and the lexicon the phenomena chosen bring together renowned experts in syntax and represent the consensus reached as to what has to be considered as an important as well as illustrative syntactic phenomenon the phenomena discuss do not only serve to show syntactic analyses but also to compare theoretical approaches with each other

this book investigates the architecture of the language faculty by considering what the properties of language reveal about the mental abilities and processes involved in language acquisition the language faculty the author argues must be able not only to accommodate what is general exceptionless and universal in language but must also be capable of dealing with what is irregular exceptional and idiosyncratic in syntactic nuts peter culicover shows that this is true not only of the lexicon but for syntax marginal and exceptional cases where there is no straightforward form meaning correspondence are dealt with by the language faculty easily and precisely as the general cases in considering how and why this should be the author argues against the prevailing trend in generative grammar which takes the learner as either incorporating maximally global generalisations as part of its innate capacity for language or projecting global generalisations from a very limited input on the basis of innate mechanisms he suggests that the learning mechanism does not generalize significantly beyond the evidence presented to it and further that it seeks to form generalizations based on

all and only the evidence presented to it syntactic nuts makes a fundamental contribution to generative grammar and syntactic theory it situates syntactic theory within cognitive science in a novel way it contributes to an alternative and yet in many ways traditional perspective on the manner in which knowledge is represented and processed in the mind

the fiftieth anniversary edition of a landmark work in generative grammar that continues to be influential with a new preface by the author noam chomsky s aspects of the theory of syntax published in 1965 was a landmark work in generative grammar that introduced certain technical innovations still drawn upon in contemporary work the fiftieth anniversary edition of this influential book includes a new preface by the author that identifies proposals that seem to be of lasting significance reviews changes and improvements in the formulation and implementation of basic ideas and addresses some of the controversies that arose over the general framework beginning in the mid fifties and emanating largely from mit linguists developed an approach to linguistic theory and to the study of the structure of particular languages that diverged in many respects from conventional modern linguistics although the new approach was connected to the traditional study of languages it differed enough in its specific conclusions about the structure of language to warrant a name generative grammar various deficiencies were discovered in the first attempts to formulate a theory of transformational generative grammar and in the descriptive analysis of particular languages that motivated these formulations at the same time it became apparent that these formulations can be extended and deepened in this book chomsky reviews these developments and proposes a reformulation of the theory of transformational generative grammar that takes them into account the emphasis in this study is syntax semantic and phonological aspects of the language structure are discussed only insofar as they bear on syntactic theory

this book argues convincingly against the widespread opinion that very few syntactic studies were carried out before the 1950s relying on the detailed analysis of a large amount of original sources it shows that syntactic matters were in fact carefully investigated throughout both the 19th century and during the first half of the 20th century moreover it illustrates how the enormous development of syntactic research in the last fifty years has already condemned even several recent ideas and analyses to oblivion and deeply influenced current research programs the wealth of research undertaken over the last two centuries is presented here in a systematic way taking as its starting point the relationship of syntax with psychology throughout this period the critical ideas expressed in the text are based on a detailed illustration of the different syntactic models and analyses rather than on the polemics between the different schools
