a new analysis of human nature and behavior in biblical perspective by two evangelical experts this comprehensive textbook discusses four key aspects of the human person by exploring the relationship between origin and destiny substance and identity function and behavior and relationships and community the authors argue that an integrated approach of theology and psychology not only enhances our understanding of what it means to be human but is also key to that understanding

three essays reflect the exploratory nature of religion and personality a field still in its infancy in divinity studies each of the eleven authors applies the insights of psychology both theoretical and clinical to important elements of christian thought and religious meaning new light is shed on such central concepts as faith guilt and salvation the relation between belief and myth is defined and the old controversy about demythologization receives fresh impetus

this title was first published in 2002 many people are now interested in the relationship between religion and science but links between christian belief and psychology have been relatively neglected this book opens up the dialogue between christian theology and modern scientific psychology approaching the dialogue in both directions current scientific topics like consciousness and artificial intelligence are examined from a religious perspective christian themes such as god s purposes and activity in the world are then examined in the light of psychology this accessible study on psychology and christian belief offers students and general readers alike important insights into new areas of the science and religion debate

is the human self singular and unified or essentially plural this book explores the seemingly disparate ways that christian theology and the secular human sciences have approached

this complex question the latter have largely embraced the idea of the plural self as an inescapable even adaptive feature of psychological life contemporary christian theology by contrast has largely neglected recent psychological accounts of the naturalness of self plurality and has sought to reaffirm the self's unity in opposition to those postmodern theorists who would dismantle it through an original analysis of recent theological and secular accounts of self and personhood this book examines the extent of the intertheoretical disparity and its broader implications for theology's dialogue with the human sciences in general and psychology in particular it explains why theologians ought to take questions about the plurality of self very seriously and how they overlap with many of the central concerns of contemporary theological anthropology including the notions of relationality particularity and human sinfulness introducing a novel psychological framework to distinguish various understandings of self disunity the author argues that contemporary theology's blanket condemnation of self multiplicity is misconceived and identifies a possible means of reconciling theological and human scientific accounts

jung's correspondence with one of the twentieth century's leading theologians and ecumenicists on theology and psychology brings together c g jung's correspondence with adolf keller a celebrated protestant theologian who was one of the pioneers of the modern ecumenical movement and one of the first religious leaders to become interested in analytical psychology their relationship spanned half a century and for many years keller was the only major religious leader to align himself with jung and his ideas both men shared a lifelong engagement with questions of faith and each grappled with god in his own distinctive way presented here in english for the first time are letters that provide a rare look at jung in dialogue with a theologian spanning some fifty years these letters reveal an extended intellectual and spiritual discourse between two very different men as they exchange views on the nature of the divine the compatibility of jungian psychology and christianity the interpretation of the bible and figures such as jesus and job and the phenomenon of national socialism although keller was powerfully attracted to jung's ideas

his correspondence with the famed psychiatrist demonstrates that he avoided discipleship both men struggled with essential questions about human existence spirituality and well being and both sought common ground where the concerns of psychologists and theologians converge featuring an illuminating introduction by marianne jehle wildberger on theology and psychology offers incomparable insights into the development of jung s views on theology and religion and a unique window into a spiritual and intellectual friendship unlike any other

how do christians in the twenty first century understand psychological disorders what does scripture have to teach us about these conditions marcia webb examines attitudes about psychological disorder in the church today and compares them to the scriptural testimony she offers theological and psychological insights to help contemporary christians integrate biblical perspectives with current scientific knowledge about mental illness

the relationship between psychology and christian theology has been one of the most important topics in the science and religion fields discussions however are too frequently one sided this book takes an alternative approach following the lead of fraser watts the contributions develop various aspects of the mutual enrichment of each discipline by the other moving beyond outdated models of conflict and independence this book highlights areas of fruitful enhancement at the interface of christian belief and practice with psychology set out in four sections the book s chapters first engage methodological and substantive issues in the interdisciplinarity raised by the dialogue between psychology and theology second chapters explore a variety of areas in which psychology enriches theology looking at both historical and contemporary themes such as psychoanalysis embodiment and mindfulness chapters in the third section explore some of the theological enrichments of psychology with topics including character strengths wisdom and forgiveness the final section engages aspects of mutual enrichment in religious life and pastoral care with an applied focus on mental health meditation prayer spiritual direction and spirituality a refreshing alternative study of the mutual enrichment of psychology and theology with

theoretical and practical applications this book reinforces the need for both disciplines to pursue creative and constructive engagement with each other of interest to scholars in psychology theology and religious studies this book will also be of interest more widely as a case study of successful interdisciplinary work

psychology and theology interface at four levels theory development research process data collection and clinical operation at each level they connect in the model of humanness anthropology forming and functioning there and in that model of humanness it is in personality theory that psychology illumines theology and that psychology illumines theology a theologian who does not take full advantage of the way psychology illumines theology is not serious about the work of theology a psychologist who does not take full advantage of the way theology illumines psychology is not serious about the field and practice of psychology science religion and health explains in readable style how that interface and mutual illumination works and why it is crucial for christian psychotherapists and pastors

fear as humans we experience fear repeatedly throughout our lives this book goes beyond these times of fear to explore the realm of terror terror creates a psychological and spiritual disconnect that has the ability to affect individuals and groups for their entire lives this is a book about the symptoms and effects of such terror in this book a e gillies seeks to educate the christian church both professionals and laity to identify the wounded warriors who have suffered such terror in order to hear their stories and to expand our understanding of how repeated terrorization can create complex traumatic stress it is a book that looks at the psychological and spiritual nature of human attachment and how insecure attachment can develop in childhood due to traumatic experiences the author s ultimate goal is to further motivate the church to recognize comfort and care for traumatized individuals ultimately it is through relationships with god and compassionate individuals that restoration can be accomplished

theologians and religious figures often draw a distinction between religion of the head and

religion of the heart but few stop to ask what the terms head and heart actually denote many assume that this distinction has a scriptural basis and yet many biblical authors used the word heart as a synonym for mind in fact there isn't a strict separation of the two concepts until the modern period as in pascal's famous claim that the heart has its reasons that reason can not know since then many other philosophers and theologians have made a similar distinction the fact that this distinction has been so persistent makes it an important area of study head and heart perspectives from religion and psychology takes an interdisciplinary approach linking the thinking of theologians and philosophers with theory and research in present day psychology the tradition of using framing questions that have been developed in theology and philosophy can now be brought into dialogue with scientific approaches developed within cognitive psychology and neuroscience though these scientific approaches have not generally used the terms head and heart they have arrived at a similar distinction in other ways there is a notable convergence upon the realization that humans have two modes of cognition at their disposal that correspond to head and heart the time is therefore ripe to bring the approaches of theology and science in to dialogue an important dialogue that has been heretofore neglected head and heart draws on the unique expertise in relating theology and psychology of the university of cambridge's psychology and religion research group prrg in addition to providing historical and theoretical perspectives the contributors to this volume will also address practical issues arising from the group's applied work in deradicalisation and religious education contributors include geoff dumbreck nicholas j s gibson malcolm guite liz gulliford russell re manning glendon l moriarty sally myers sara savage carissa a sharp fraser watts harris wiseman and bonnie poon zahl
