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this reader brings together original and influential recent work in the field of early modern european history provides a thought provoking overview of current thinking on this period key themes include evolving early modern identities changes in religion and cultural life the revolution of the mind

roles of women in early modern societies the rise of the modern state and europe and the new world system incorporates new scholarship on eastern and central europe includes an article translated into english for the first time

the study of pre modern anthropology requires the close examination of the relationship between nature and human society which has been both precarious and threatening as well as productive soothing inviting and pleasurable much depends on the specific circumstances as the works by philosophers theologians poets artists and medical practitioners have regularly demonstrated it would not be good enough as previous scholarship has commonly done to examine simply what the various writers or artists had to say about nature while modern scientists consider just the hard core data of the objective world cultural historians and literary scholars endeavor to comprehend the deeper meaning of the concept of nature presented by countless writers and artists only when we have a good grasp of the interactions between people and their natural environment are we in a position to identify and interpret mental structures social and economic relationships medical and scientific concepts of human health and the messages about all existence as depicted in major art works in light of the current conditions threatening to bring upon us a global crisis it matters centrally to take into consideration pre modern discourses on nature and its enormous powers to understand the topoi and tropes determining the concepts through which we perceive nature nature thus proves to be a force far beyond all human comprehensibility being both material and spiritual depending on our critical approaches

the sixteenth and seventeenth centuries have traditionally been regarded by historians as a period of intense and formative historical change so much so that they have often been described as early modern an epoch separate from the medieval and the modern paying particular attention to england this book reflects on the implications of this categorization for contemporary debates about the nature of modernity and society the book traces the forgotten history of the phrase early modern to its coinage as a category of historical analysis by the victorians and considers when and why words like modern and society were first introduced into english in the sixteenth and seventeenth centuries in so doing it unpicks the connections between linguistic and social change and how the consequences of those processes still resonate today a major contribution to our understanding of european history before 1700 and its resonance for social thought today the book will interest anybody concerned with the historical antecedents of contemporary culture and the interconnections between the past and the present

how can the concept of nostalgia illuminate the culturally specific ways in which societies understand the contested relationship between the past present and future the word nostalgia was invented in the late seventeenth century to describe the debilitating effects of homesickness now widely defined as a sense of longing for a lost past initially it was more closely linked with dislocation in space by exploring some of its many textual visual and musical manifestations in the tumultuous period between c 1350 and 1800 this volume resists the assumption that nostalgia is a distinctive by

product of modernity it also forges a fruitful link between three lively areas of current scholarly enquiry memory temporality and emotion the contributors deploy nostalgia as a tool for investigating perceptions of the passage of time and historical change unsettling experiences of migration and geographical displacement and the connections between remembering and forgetting affect and imagination ranging across europe and the atlantic world they examine the moments sites and communities in which it arose alongside how it was used to express both criticism and regret about the religious political social and cultural upheavals that shaped the early modern world they approach it as a complex mixed feeling that opens a new window into individual subjectivities and collective mentalities

the notions of other peoples cultures and natural conditions have always been determined by the epistemology of imagination and fantasy providing much freedom and creativity and yet have also created much fear anxiety and horror in this regard the pre modern world demonstrates striking parallels with our own insofar as the projections of alterity might be different by degrees but they are fundamentally the same by content dreams illusions projections concepts hopes utopias dystopias desires and emotional attachments are as specific and impactful as the physical environment this volume thus sheds important light on the various lenses used by people in the middle ages and the early modern age as to how they came to terms with their perceptions images and notions previous scholarship focused heavily on the history of mentality and history of emotions whereas here the history of pre modern imagination and fantasy assumes center position imaginary things are taken seriously because medieval and early modern writers and artists clearly reveal their great significance in their works and their daily lives this approach facilitates a new deep structure analysis of pre modern culture

global interactions in the early modern age is an interdisciplinary introduction to cross cultural encounters in the early modern age 1400 1800 and their influences on the development of world societies in the aftermath of mongol expansion across eurasia the unprecedented rise of imperial states in the early modern period set in motion interactions between people from around the world these included new commercial networks large scale migration streams global biological exchanges and transfers of knowledge across oceans and continents these in turn wove together the major regions of the world in an age of extensive cultural political military and economic contact a host of individuals companies tribes states and empires were in

competition yet they also cooperated with one another leading ultimately to the integration of global space

how did gender figure in understandings of spatial realms from the inner spaces of the body to the furthest reaches of the globe how did women situate themselves in the early modern world and how did they move through it in both real and imaginary locations how do new disciplinary and geographic connections shape the ways we think about the early modern world and the role of women and men in it these are the questions that guide this volume which includes articles by a select group of scholars from many disciplines art history comparative literature english german history landscape architecture music and women s studies each essay reaches across fields and several are written by interdisciplinary groups of authors the essays also focus on many different places including rome amsterdam london and paris and on texts and images that crossed the atlantic and the mediterranean or that portrayed real and imagined people who did many essays investigate topics key to the spatial turn in various disciplines such as borders and their permeability actual and metaphorical spatial crossings travel and displacement and the built environment

while there is an growing body of work on space and place in many disciplines less attention has been paid to how a spatial approach illuminates the societies and cultures of the past here leading experts explore the uses of space in two respects how space can be applied to the study of history and how space was used at specific times

this volume takes a fresh and innovative approach to the history of ideas of work concerning perceptions attitudes cultures and representations of work throughout antiquity and the medieval and early modern periods focusing on developments in europe the contributors approach the subject from a variety of angles considering aspects of work as described in literature visual culture and as perceived in economic theory as well as external views of workers the volume also looks at the meaning of work for the self perception of various social groups including labourers artisans merchants and noblemen and the effects of this on their self esteem and social identity taking a broad chronological approach to the subject provides readers with a cutting edge overview of research into the varying attitudes to work and its place in pre industrial society

kevin de ornellas argues that in renaissance england the relationship between horse and rider works as an unambiguous symbol of domination by the strong over the weak there was little sentimental concern for animal welfare leading to the routine abuse of the material animal this unproblematic practical exploitation of the horse led to the currency of the horse rider relationship as a trope or symbol of exploitation in the literature of the period

engaging with fiction plays poems and non fictional prose works of late tudor and early stuart england de ornellas demonstrates that the horse a bridled unwilling slave becomes a yardstick against which the oppression of england s poor women increasingly uninfluential clergyman and deluded gamblers is measured the status of the bitted harnessed horse was a low one in early modern england to be compared to such a beast is a demonstration of inferiority and subjugation to think anything else is to be naïve about the realities of horse management in the period and is to be naïve about the realities of the exploitation of horses and other mammals in the present day world

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
