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in this wide ranging discussion of kabbalah from the mystical trends of medieval judaism to modern hasidism one of the world's foremost scholars considers different visions of the nature of the sacred text and of the methods to interpret it moshe idel takes as a starting point the fact that the postbiblical jewish world lost its geographical center with the destruction of the temple and so was left with a textual center the holy book idel argues that a text oriented religion produced language centered forms of mysticism against this background the author demonstrates how various jewish mystics amplified the content of the scriptures so as to include everything the world or god for example thus the text becomes a major realm for contemplation and the interpretation of the text frequently becomes an encounter with the deepest realms of reality idel delineates the particular hermeneutics belonging to jewish mysticism investigates the progressive filling of the text with secrets and hidden levels of meaning and considers in detail the various interpretive strategies needed to decode the arcane dimensions of the text

focuses on a range of jewish and non jewish writers to examine the intersection of kabbalah the jewish mystical tradition and secular jewish literatures kabbalah and literature shows how the jewish mystical tradition contributes to the renewal of literature in a modern global and increasingly disconnected age kitty millet explores kabbalah's conceptual underpinnings aesthetic principles tenets and signifiers to demonstrate how literature's absorption of kabbalistic material has altered its ontology function and the tasks it sets for itself reading writers from europe and the americas kitty millet maps how the kabbalist's desire to recover eden transforms into a latent messianic drive only intuited through text thus it charts a journey of sorts a migration of jewish mystical material embedded surreptitiously within text in order to shift ever so slightly at times the range of the literary to encompass an aesthetic vision not easily reducible to the literal the known the allegorical or even the philosophical in this way kabbalah and literature proposes a novel intuitive approach shifting focus away from the jewish text's epistemological elements to embrace its secrets

no one theory of time is pursued in these essays but a major theme that threads them together is wolfson's signature idea of the timeswerve as a linear circularity or a circular linearity expressions that are meant to avoid the conventional split between the two temporal modalities of the line and the circle the conception of time elicited by wolfson from a host of philosophical and mystical sources both jewish and non jewish buttresses the contention that it is precisely structural invariability that engenders interpretive variation this hermeneutical axiom is justified in turn by the presumption regarding the cadence of time as the constant return of what has always been what is yet to be the telling of time wells forth from the time of telling one cannot speak of the being of time consequently except from the standpoint of the time of being nor of the time of being except from the standpoint of the being of time

an annotated anthology of jewish mystical works concepts and experiences a kabbalah and jewish mysticism reader explores issues relating to what has compelled jews to seek a more intimate relationship with god it does this by providing readings from the most important mystical texts accompanied by daniel m horwitz's insightful introductions and commentary it is carefully designed to make the basic concepts and teachings of jewish mysticism accessible to a wide audience and to ground these ideas within the broader jewish tradition horwitz's introduction describes five major types of jewish mysticism and includes a brief chronology of its development with a timeline he begins with biblical prophecy and proceeds through the early mystical movements up through current beliefs chapters on key subjects characterize mystical expression through the ages such as creation and deveikut cleaving to god the role of torah the erotic inclinations toward good and evil magic prayer and ritual and more later chapters deal with hasidism the great mystical revival and twentieth century mystics including abraham isaac kook kalonymous kalman shapira and abraham joshua heschel a final chapter addresses today's controversies concerning mysticism's place within judaism and its potential for enriching the religion daniel m horwitz is chapel rabbi at congregation beth yeshurun in houston texas he is a teacher at the akiba academy of beth yeshurun and the houston melton adult mini school

the set of jewish mystical teachings known as kabbalah are often imagined as timeless texts teachings that have been passed down through the millennia yet as this groundbreaking new study shows kabbalah flourished in a specific time and place emerging in response to the social prejudices that jews faced hartley lachter a scholar of religion studies transports us to medieval spain a place where anti semitic propaganda was on the rise and jewish political power was on the wane kabbalistic revolution proposes that given this context kabbalah must be understood as a radically empowering political discourse while the era's christian preachers claimed that jews were blind to the true meaning of scripture and had been abandoned by god the kabbalists countered with a doctrine that granted jews a uniquely privileged relationship with god lachter demonstrates how kabbalah envisioned this increasingly marginalized group at the center of the universe their mystical practices serving to maintain the harmony of the divine world for students of jewish mysticism kabbalistic revolution provides a new approach to the development of medieval kabbalah yet the book's central questions should appeal to anyone with an interest in the relationships between religious discourses political struggles and ethnic pride

kabbalistic manuscripts and textual theory uncovers the unstated assumptions and expectations of scribes and scholars who fashioned editions from manuscripts of jewish mystical literature this study offers a theory of kabbalistic textuality in which the material book the printed page no less than handwritten manuscripts serves as the site for textual dialogue between jewish mystics of different periods and locations the refashioning of the text through the process of reading and commenting that takes place on the page in the margins and between the lines blurs the boundaries between the traditionally defined roles of author reader commentator and editor this study shows that kabbalists and academic editors reinvented the text in their own image as part of a fluid textual process that was nothing short of transformative this book is certainly monumental offering in its seven hundred pages a wealth of documentation and distilled argument that manages to be both comprehensive in its materials and transparent in its critical insights it is rare indeed that a work of such formidable scholarship can actually be a pleasure to read and convincing in its elucidation of what are often extremely complex documentary circumstances and editorial traditions from the foreword by david greetham

a text supplemented by more than a hundred illustrations of letters art and sculpture covers such topics as the four divine names and the five modalities of being the life of infinity and the significance of each of the twenty two letters of the hebrew alphabet

this remarkable and groundbreaking study explores the author's view that there is a close correspondence between the basic tenets of alchemy and those of jewish esoteric tradition generally known as kabbalah the author arturo schwarz points out that both alchemy and kabbalah are frequently distorted in popular as well as scholarly literature the real concern of alchemy is not

to transmute lead into gold but rather through the investigation of the self to evolve from the state of ignorance symbolized by lead to that of awareness symbolized by gold as schwarz points out this drive toward self awareness is also basic in the teachings of the major kabbalists schwarz goes on to explain that in both systems one of the major instruments of understanding our inner self is love both physical and spiritual through a careful analysis of the use of sexual imagery in both systems schwarz builds his fascinating and eye opening thesis that alchemy and kabbalistic tradition share profound similarities

rather than treating the jewish kabbalah as merely one heretical doctrine among others in fuente s novel *tera nostra* penn spanish u of leicester argues that examining its presence is vital for understanding both the theme and style he draws on 20th century scholarship showing links between jewish mysticism and theories of history and textuality and literary implementations of the kabbalah by writers who significantly influenced fuentes such as alejo carpentier and jorge luis borges his discusses the kabbalistic concept of language and its operation in the novel *celestina* as metaphysical woman kabbalistic time and a novelistic historiography the text is double spaced annotation 2004 book news inc portland or booknews com
