the range of walt disney s accomplishments is remarkable he is considered the most successful filmmaker in history he won 32 academy awards far more than those of any other filmmaker he revolutionized the amusement park and resort industries and his theme parks have been praised as among the most outstanding urban designs in the united states as ward kimball one of walt disney s most prominent animators once said at the bottom line walt was a down to earth farmer s son who just happened to be a genius walt disney spent his formative years in missouri some of the direct influences of these years on his career are documented in this book snow white and the seven dwarfs the first feature length animated film to be produced was inspired by a black and white live action silent film version of snow white that he viewed as a teen ager in kansas city a theatrical production of peter pan that he saw as a child in marceline mo led to his own animated version of the story born in chicago in december 1901 he moved with his family to a farm near marceline where he lived from ages 4 to 9 to tell the truth walt disney once wrote more things of importance happened to me in marceline than have happened since or are likely to in the future the town of marceline was the inspiration for many features of future disney theme parks and the pastoral setting he lived in there is also reflected in many of his films except for a couple of years spent in chicago and france disney lived in kansas city from 1911 to 1923 during his years in kansas city he learned the discipline that would enable him to persevere and prevail through the many hardships he experienced as a struggling filmmaker it was in kansas city that he trained to become a commercial artist and an animator and kansas city was the location of his first film production studio laugh o gram films walt disney s missouri not only tells the story of the young disney growing up but it also paints a picture of the kansas city he knew with the bankruptcy of laugh o gram films disney moved to california drawing

with him many of his kansas city colleagues who would eventually win fame in animation themselves this richly illustrated book describes disney s missouri years and chronicles his many connections and returns to the state until his death in 1966 the book also details two little know projects in missouri that disney seriously considered in his later years theme parks in his hometown marceline and in st louis as his daughter diane disney miller says in the foreword to the book walt disney was truly a missourian

a collection of essays exploring the wide ranging influence of the walt disney company it would be difficult to go through life without ever encountering a disney product since the first mickey mouse cartoon premiered in 1928 disney has played a central role in shaping american popular culture and it has expanded to the global market the company positioned itself as a titan of family entertainment and many of its offerings from films to consumable products have become embedded in the minds of children and adults woven into many of our life experiences fans of disney build connections with their favorite characters and franchises fueled by disney s marketing practices others have developed a near cult like relationship with the brand equating its products with religious icons and theme park visits with pilgrimages this edited volume looks beyond the movies and merchandise to peer into the very heart of the disney phenomenon how the fan response drives the corporation s massive marketing machine and how the corporate response in turn shapes the fan experience

contributions by walter benjamin lillian disney walt disney e m forster stephen jay gould m thomas inge jim korkis anna quindlen diego rivera gilbert seldes maurice sendak john updike irving wallace cholly wood and many others ranging from the playful to the fact filled and to the thoughtful this collection tracks the fortunes of walt disney s flagship character from the first full fledged review of his screen debut in november 1928 to the present day mickey mouse has won millions of fans and charmed even the harshest of critics almost half of the eighty one texts in a mickey mouse reader document the mouse s rise to glory from that first cartoon steamboat willie through his seventh year when his first color animation the band concert was released they include two important early critiques one by the american culture critic gilbert seldes and one by the famed english novelist e m forster articles and essays chronicle the continued rise of mickey mouse to the rank of true icon he remains arguably the most vivid graphic expression to date of key traits of the american character pluck cheerfulness innocence energy and fidelity to family and friends among press reports in the book is one from june 1944 that puts to rest the urban legend that mickey mouse was a password or code word on d day it was however the

password for a major pre invasion briefing other items illuminate the origins of mickey mouse as a term for things deemed petty or unsophisticated one piece explains how walt and brother roy disney almost single handedly invented the strategy of corporate synergy by tagging sales of mickey mouse toys and goods to the release of mickey s latest cartoons shorts in two especially interesting essays maurice sendak and john updike look back over the years and give their personal reflections on the character they loved as boys growing up in the 1930s

his classic films illuminated everyone s childhood the theme parks are onvery tourist itinerary the movie empire is one of hollywood s biggestlayers walt disney is one of the few men who unquestionably changed ourulture neal gabler is the first author to have had complete access to theisney archives enabling him to write the definitive biography of thisemarkable man it s a long book as disney s achievement was so huge but aruly compulsive read he shows how disney built up his fledgling studio withhort cartoons featuring mickey mouse and donald duck before quite simplyeinventing animation with full length films like snow white pinocchio ambi and dumbo an astounding amount of work went into a film like fantasia with whole crews working round the clock on a sequence a couple of minutesong only for the obsessively perfectionist disney to order it re done alt s profligacy and expansionism meant it was brother and business partneroy who kept the company solvent disney then moved beyond animation withuge successes like mary poppins and mixed utopianism and merchandising to

a world without mickey he couldn't take it any more disney the laughs the fun the noise how to make it stop of

course use the time machine go back and stop walt disney from creating mickey mouse without mickey there would be no disneyland no disney films no disney

branded a cultural chernobyl and the tragic kingdom the euro disney resort has been on its own thrill ride since opening in 1992 the much publicized version of the magic kingdom gave europeans alcohol free mocktails surly employees even colors too muted for the disney image facing financial disaster was it any wonder that disney execs found themselves wishing upon a star for answers after so many knee jerk criticisms of euro disney this book combines firsthand experience and research to shed new light on claims that the park is nothing more than a form of american cultural imperialism andrew lainsbury a former euro disney employee who knows what the park meant to its visitors goes beyond media bites and academic scorn to examine europe s love hate relationship with euro disneyland and some of the undiscussed issues surrounding it once upon an american dream is a story of global capitalism on a grand scale lainsbury has plumbed company archives and interviewed key players to give readers the real view from le chateau de la belle au bois dormant sleeping beauty s castle he cracks open the euro disney controversy to reveal the park not as a tragic experiment in exporting american culture but the result of european efforts to import a popular form of american entertainment lainsbury tells how the walt disney company came to build a european park and locate it in france how political negotiations affected its design and development how it was promoted to continental audiences and what caused its widely publicized financial woes before being rescued by a real prince from saudi arabia he reveals what it took to win back the hearts of skeptical europeans such as serving wine selling flashy merchandise and placating disgruntled workers finally he looks into the magic mirror to speculate on the role of euro disney and the walt disney company in the twenty first century ultimately lainsbury shows that cultural imperialism is not an exclusively american phenomenon but a global corporate strategy and that global corporatism by needing to be responsive to consumers is so complex that it may not be as monolithic as feared once upon an american dream is a fairy tale for our times reminding us that for all the critical huffing and puffing the creation and marketing of pleasure is what euro disneyland is all about

upholds a disney vacation as a religious experience offers insightful arguments relating to the nature of play as well as nietzschean philosophy reading religion rituals mark significant moments in our lives perhaps none more significant than moments of lightheartedness joy and play rituals of play are among the most sacred of any of the rites in which humanity may engage although we may fail to recognize them they are always present in culture providing a kind of psychological release for their participants child and adult alike disneyland is an example of the kind of container necessary for the construction of rituals of play this work explores the original disney theme park in anaheim as a temple cult it challenges the disciplines of mythological studies religious studies film studies and depth psychology to broaden traditional definitions of the kind of cultural apparatus that constitute temple culture and ritual it does so by suggesting that hollywood s entertainment industry has developed a platform for mythic ritual after setting the ritualized stage this book turns to the practices in disneyland proper analyzing the patron s traditions within the framework of the park and beyond it explores disneyland s spectacles through selected shows and parades and concludes with an exploration of the park s participation in ritual renewal there is much to commend in koehler s study surely her work should encourage others to examine myth construction and sacred secular rituals in popular culture h celebration

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
