The musical staff consists of five horizontal lines and four spaces Clefs indicate the pitch of the notes written on the staff The most common clefs are the treble clef used for higherpitched instruments and voices and the bass clef used for lowerpitched instruments and voices Question What is the purpose of a clef Answer A clef indicates the pitch of the notes written on the staff Notes are represented by oval symbols placed on or between the lines and spaces of the staff Each line and space represents a specific pitch Question Where would you place a note representing middle C D E F G on the treble clef staff III Intervals and Scales A Intervals Presentation An interval is the distance between two notes Intervals are named according to the number of scale degrees they encompass eg second third fourth Question What is the interval between C and E Answer A major third Reinforcement Identify the intervals between the following pairs AC DF GB B Major Scales Presentation A major scale is a sevennote scale with a specific pattern of whole and half steps WWHWWWH A whole step is two half steps Question What is the pattern of whole and half steps in a major scale Answer WWHWWWH Reinforcement Write out the C major scale Then try writing the G major scale IV Chords A Triads Presentation A triad is a threenote chord built on a root note Major triads consist of a root major third and perfect fifth Minor triads consist of a root minor third and perfect fifth Question What are the intervals in a major triad Answer Root major third perfect fifth Reinforcement Construct a C major triad and a C minor triad B Chord Progressions Presentation Chord progressions are sequences of chords used in music Common 3 progressions include IIVVI in Roman numerals in major keys Question What is the most common chord progression in a major key Answer IIVVI Reinforcement Write out the IIVVI progression in C major V Rhythm and Time Signatures A Time Signatures Presentation Time signatures indicate the number of beats per measure top number and the type of note that receives one beat bottom number For example 44 means four quarter notes per measure Question What does the time signature 34 indicate Answer Three quarter notes per measure Reinforcement Identify the time signature in a given musical example provide a simple example B Note Values Presentation Notes have different durations A whole note gets four beats in 44 time a half note gets two beats a quarter note gets one beat and so on Question How many quarter notes equal a half note Answer Two Reinforcement Write a measure of 44 time containing two quarter notes and one half note VI Common Pitfalls to Avoid Jumping Ahead Focus on mastering one concept before moving to the next Ignoring Practice Regular practice is crucial Use your knowledge to create simple melodies and chord progressions Not Seeking Feedback If youre stuck seek help from a teacher or online
