nature of human knowledge the result was one of the most striking and famous works in the history of philosophy

this book reads representations of western music in literary texts to reveal the ways in which artifacts of imperial culture function within contemporary world literature bushnell argues that western music's conventions for performance composition and listening established during the colonial period persist in postcolonial thought and practice music from the baroque classical and romantic periods bach through brahms coincides with the rise of colonialism and western music contains imperial attitudes and values embedded within its conventions standards and rules the book focuses on the culture of classical music as reflected in the worlds of characters and texts and contends that its effects outlast the historical significance of the real composers pieces styles and forms through examples by authors such as mcewan vikram seth bernard maclaverty chang rae lee and j m coetzee the book demonstrates how western music enters narrative as both acts of history and as structures of analogy that suggest subject positions human relations and political activity that in turn describes a postcolonial condition the uses to which western music is put in each literary text reveals how european art music of the seventeenth through the nineteenth centuries is read and misread by postcolonial generations exposing mostly hidden cultural structures that influence our contemporary understandings of social relations and hierarchies norms for resolution and for assigning significance and standards of propriety the book presents strategies for thinking anew about the persistence of cultural imperialism reading western music simultaneously as representative of imperial cultural dominance and as suggestive of resistant structures forms and practices that challenge the imperial hegemony

the oneiric in the films of david lynch is the first systematic book length study to explore the nature and function of dreams in david lynch's different phases and audio visual formats there is hardly a contemporary film director whose name is as closely linked to the dream like as that of david lynch both popular and academic discourse frequently identify lynch's films by their dreamlike qualities however in the existing literature on lynch these qualities tend to remain underspecified in terms of their experiential dimension departing from an interest in the phenomenon of dream experience this is the first systematic book length study exploring the nature and function of the oneiric in the director's different phases and audio visual formats it shows that over the course of 50 years lynch has developed a cinematic aesthetics of the oneiric an ensemble of four dream related dimensions that unfolds its full potential in the dynamic interplay between sensory address and reflective medialization on the one hand the lynchian oneiric presents a markedly sensory perceptual mode of experience both characters and viewers are challenged in their perceptual patterns while at the same time being immersed in the material dream scenario on the other hand the lynchian oneiric provides a mode of both psychological and medial reflection not only the characters but the films themselves are inclined to turn back on themselves in a dream exploring the

preconditions possibilities and limitations of their own existence and ability to know the world the oneiric in lynch s films is thus of phenomenological media theoretical and philosophical interest

bachelor thesis from the year 2017 in the subject english language and literature studies comparative literature grade 1 0 language english abstract this paper focuses on david foster wallace collected essays about tennis which is called string theory the five essays approach and use the sport for different goals in his typical manner tennis becomes a starting point for quite different topics be it wallace s own life his thoughts on a literary genre in this case top athletes autobiographies masculine physicality transcendence or the industry behind sports events while stylistically wallace follows the method of thick description injecting elements of metafiction and humor he ultimately takes tennis as a starting point for ontological questions in his search for some form of deeper insight or even truth that can be found on the sidelines of his respective topic his approach to writing essays and the function and possibilities of that literary form displays apparent similarities with the work of the protagonists of the so called new journalism after a brief introduction to new journalism as a mode of writing and some of its elements and key terms the author will focus on wallace s five tennis essays individually in addition to connecting his m o to the tradition of new journalism on the formal and content level the author will provide a reading of each of wallace s tennis essays with recourses to different theoretical approaches in other words this paper will probe each essay for the question about what is he really writing how wallace is doing it and why he chooses tennis of all things that functions as his way in in addition to his work as a writer of fiction his bibliography includes three novels and three short story collections david foster wallace has written a large number of essays most of them for

magazines and newspapers his topics range from literature and film to mathematics from music and subcultures to travel and the tourism industry from politics to food and have been issued in numerous collections before and after his self inflicted death in 2008

much effort in recent philosophy has been devoted to attacking the metaphysics of the subject identified largely with french post structuralist thought yet stemming primarily from the influential work of the later heidegger this attack has taken the form of a sweeping denunciation of the whole tradition of modern philosophy from descartes through nietzsche husserl and existentialism in this timely study david carr contends that this discussion has overlooked and eventually lost sight of the distinction between modern metaphysics and the tradition of transcendental philosophy inaugurated by kant and continued by husserl into the twentieth century carr maintains that the transcendental tradition often misinterpreted as a mere alternative version of the metaphysics of the subject is in fact itself directed against such a metaphysics challenging prevailing views of the development of modern philosophy carr proposes a reinterpretation of the transcendental tradition and counters heidegger s influential readings of kant and husserl he defends their subtle and complex transcendental investigations of the self and the life of subjectivity in carr s interpretation far from joining the project of metaphysical foundationalism transcendental philosophy offers epistemological critique and phenomenological description its aim is not metaphysical conclusions but rather an appreciation for the rich and sometimes contradictory character of experience the transcendental approach to the self is skillfully summed up by husserl as the paradox of human subjectivity being a subject for the world and at the same time being an object in the world proposing striking new readings of kant and husserl and reviving a sound awareness of the transcendental tradition carr s distinctive historical and systematic position will interest a wide range of readers and provoke discussion among philosophers of metaphysics epistemology and the history of philosophy
