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collaboration between artists has been practised for centuries yet over recent decades the act of collaborating has taken different meanings this publication examines cultural philosophical and political issues tied to specific instances of collaborative practice in the performing arts leading scholars and practitioners review historical developments of collaborative practice and reveal what it means to work together in creative contexts at the beginning of the twenty first century key questions addressed include how artists are developing new ways of working together in response to contemporary economic trends the significance of collaborating across culture and what opportunities are apparent when co working between genres and disciplines noyale colin and stefanie sachsenmaier present these perspectives in three thematic sections which interrogate the premises of collective intentions the working strategies of current practitioners as well as the role of failure and compromise in collaborative modes of creative work this volume is an invaluable resource for scholars practitioners and those interested in contemporary artistic methods of working

integrative performance serves a crucial need of 21st century performers by providing a transdisciplinary approach to training its radical new take on performance practice is designed for a climate that increasingly requires fully rounded artists the book critiques and interrogates key current practices and offers a proven alternative to the idea that rigorous and effective training must separate the disciplines into discrete categories of acting singing and dance experience bryon s integrative performance practice is a way of working that will profoundly shift how performers engage with their training conditioning and performance disciplines it synthesizes the various elements of performance work in order to empower the performer as they practice across disciplines within any genre style or aesthetic theory and practice are balanced throughout using regular box outs introducing the work s theoretical underpinnings through quotes case studies and critical interjections a full program of exercises ranging from training of specific muscle groups through working with text to more subtle structures for integrative awareness and presence this book is the result of over twenty years of practice and research working with interdisciplinary artists across the world to produce a training that fully prepares performers for the demands of contemporary performance and all its somatic emotive and vocal possibilities

this book explores a range of contemporary performance practices that engage spectators physically and emotionally through active engagement and critical involvement it considers how risk has been re configured re presented and re packaged for new audiences with a thirst for performances that promote encourage and embrace risky encounters in a variety of forms the collection brings together established voices on performance and risk research and draws them into conversation with next generation academic practitioners in a dynamic reappraisal of what it means to risk oneself through the act of making and

participating in performance practice it takes into account the work of other performance scholars for whom risk and precarity are central concerns but seeks to move the debate forwards in response to a rapidly changing world where risk is higher on the political economic and cultural agenda than ever before

performance practice is the study of how music was performed over the centuries both by its originators the composers and performers who introduced the works and later by revivalists this first of its kind dictionary offers entries on composers musiciansperformers technical terms performance centers musical instruments and genres all aimed at elucidating issues in performance practice this a z guide will help students scholars and listeners understand how musical works were originally performed and subsequently changed over the centuries compiled by a leading scholar in the field this work will serve as both a point of entry for beginners as well as a roadmap for advanced scholarship in the field

this volume was first published by inter disciplinary press in 2011 papers from the first global conference of performance visual aspects of performance practice 2010 evoke the multi role collaborative sense of a jointly crafted production of new discoveries from theory concept and design to realization reflection and audience reception

this volume contains key articles and chapters which represent both seminal and innovative scholarship on european theatre performance practice from 1750 to 1900 the selected topics focus on acting and performance staging including set design and lighting and audiences and are approached with a broad perspective as well as with in depth focussed analysis the volume captures the rich dynamic and variegated nature of european theatre throughout the late eighteenth and nineteenth centuries and provides a carefully selected body of significant texts on this important period of theatre history

from the series of musical handbooks this book concentrates on the study of past performances from medieval to 20th century music and looks at sources theory vocal and instrumental performance techniques the difference in instruments and playing techniques in history is also discussed stanley sadie is the editor of the new grove dictionary of music and musicians

a guide to library research in music introduces the process and techniques for researching and writing about music this informative textbook provides concrete examples of different types of writing offering a thorough introduction to music literature it clearly describes various information searching techniques and library based organizational systems and introduces the array of music resources available each chapter concludes with learning exercises to aid the students concept application

and skill development appendixes provide short cuts to specific topics in library organizational systems including library of congress subject headings and classification the concluding bibliography provides a quick overview of music literature and resources emphasizing electronic and print publications since 2000 but including standard references that all music researchers should know

this study focuses on seven women who used the fin de siècle's popular stage as a space to develop their experimental performance practices acts that won them international fame and critical acclaim the diverse entertainment careers of maud allan 1873 1956 jane avril 1868 1943 loïe fuller 1868 1926 sylvia grey 1866 1958 yvette gilbert 1867 1944 letty lind 1862 1923 and cissie cecilia loftus 1876 1943 encompassed song dance impersonation and acting in accounts reviews autobiographical writings interviews and other cultural products associated with them it is clear that individual female celebrities understood their work as creative professional and original performance practice the absence of their creative work from studies of performance history reveals much about hierarchical approaches to cultural environments gender and physical non scripted performances that demands to be interrogated

examines the principles of performing the music of haydn mozart beethoven and their contemporaries as revealed in a variety of historical sources

performance practice in the music of steve reich provides a performer's perspective on steve reich's compositions from his iconic minimalist work drumming to his masterpiece music for 18 musicians it addresses performance issues encountered by the musicians in reich's original ensemble and the techniques they developed to bring his compositions to life drawing comparisons with west african drumming and other non western music the book highlights ideas that are helpful in the

understanding and performance of rhythm in all pulse based music through conversations and interviews with the author reich discusses his percussion background and his thoughts about rhythm in relation to the music of ghana bali india and jazz he explains how he used rhythm in his early compositions the time feel he wants in his music the kind of performer who seems to be drawn to his music and the way perceptual and metrical ambiguity create interest in repetitive music

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
