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the purpose of this book is to provide a clear and systematic account of the complexities of fictional narration which result from the shifting relationship in all storytelling between the story itself and the way it is told

since its first publication in english in 1985 mieke bal s narratology has become the international classic and comprehensive introduction to the theory of narrative texts narratology is a systematic account of narrative techniques methods their transmission and reception in which bal distills years of study of the ways in which we understand both literary and non literary works in this third edition bal updates the book to include more analysis of film narratives while also sharpening and tightening her language to make it the most readable and student friendly edition to date bal also introduces new sections that treat and clarify several modernist texts that pose narratological challenges with changes prompted by ten years of feedback from scholars and teachers narratology remains the most important contribution to the study of the way narratives work are formed and are received

what is narratology sees itself as contributing to the intensive international discussion and controversy on the structure and function of narrative theory the 14 papers in the volume advance proposals for determining the object of narratology modelling its concepts and characterising its status within cultural studies

the past several decades have seen an explosion of interest in narrative with this multifaceted object of inquiry becoming a central concern in a wide range of disciplinary fields and research contexts as accounts of what happened to particular people in particular circumstances and with specific consequences stories have come to be viewed as a basic human strategy for coming to terms with time process and change however the very predominance of narrative as a focus of interest across multiple disciplines makes it imperative for scholars teachers and students to have access to a comprehensive reference resource

the 35 original essays in a companion to narrative theory constitute the best available introduction to this vital and contested field of humanistic enquiry comprises 35 original essays written by leading figures in the field includes contributions from pioneers in the field such as wayne c booth seymour chatman j hillis miller and gerald prince represents all the major critical approaches to narrative and investigates and debates the relations between them considers narratives in different disciplines such as law and medicine features analyses of a variety of media including film music and painting designed to be of interest to specialists yet accessible to readers with little prior knowledge of the field

the present volume is a contribution to the theory of narrative by scholars from various disciplines mainly scholars from comparative literature but also contributors from philosophy psychology and the languages the essays focus on central terms and concepts in narrative theory over the last forty years established narratological concepts such as narrative narrator story fiction character narrative unreliability and point of view but also relational concepts motivated by the expansion of narratology such as narrative and non verbal media narrative and personal identity and narrative and literary genre are themes dealt with in addition to presenting a critical examination of the core concepts of narrative theory the volume is a demonstration of the vigour of contemporary nordic narrative theory the authors work at universities in denmark estonia finland norway and sweden and they all belong to the nordic network of narrative studies

narrative is a powerful element of human culture storing and sharing the cherished parts of our personal memories and giving structure to our laws entertainment and history we experience narrative in words pictures and film yet regardless of how the tale is told story remains independent from the media that makes it concrete narrative follows humans wherever they travel and adapts readily to new forms of communication constantly evolving and always up to date narrative is a necessary strategy of human expression and a fundamental component of human identity in order to understand human interaction award winning scholar rick altman launches a close study of narrative s nature its variation in different contexts and the method through which it makes meaning altman s approach breaks away from traditional forms of analysis identifying three basic strategies single

how can we develop a cultural theory starting with the basic insight that human beings are storytelling animals within literary studies narratology is a highly developed field however literary historians have not paid much attention to the large and small stories abounding in everyday discourse guiding all kinds of social activity and providing common ground for whole societies but also fueling controversies and hostilities moreover narrative is not only a scholarly category but has come into use in many fields of social activity as a tool for cultural self fashioning this book is based on the assumption that to a large extent social dynamics is modeled in an aesthetic manner via narratives it explores the narrative organization of cultural spaces and time frames the mythological shaping of communities and adversaries and the co production of narratives and institutions aimed at stabilizing social life in this framework the epistemological problem looms large of how an instrument

as unreliable as narrative can participate in the creation of a social consensus regarding truth this problem endows the general topics explored in this book with a particularly contemporary dimension

offering an interdisciplinary approach to narrative this book investigates storyworlds and minds in narratives across media from literature to digital games and reality tv from online sadomasochism to oral history databases and from horror to hallucinations it addresses two core questions of contemporary narrative theory inspired by recent cognitive scientific developments what kind of a construction is a storyworld and what kind of mental functioning can be embedded in it minds and worlds become essential facets of making sense and interpreting narratives as the book asks how story internal minds relate to the mind external to the storyworld that is the mind processing the story with essays from social scientists literary scholars linguists and scholars from interactive media studies answering these topical questions the collection brings diverse disciplines into dialogue providing new openings for genuinely transdisciplinary narrative theory the wide ranging selection of materials analyzed in the book promotes knowledge on the latest forms of cultural and social meaning making through narrative necessary for navigating the contemporary mediatized cultural landscape the combination of theoretical reflection and empirical analysis makes this book an invaluable resource for scholars and advanced students in fields including literary studies social sciences art media and communication
