the constant inundation of the affect and information experienced by contemporary individuals exposes the tragic nature of the world making nihilism an epistemologically reasonable response to counter the threat of nihilism elijah prewitt davis argues that knowledge must be replaced by belief against the common protestant concept of belief as strictly personal and interior he proposes believing in the world as an absurd and immanent faith in the impossible a belief that allows one to see and feel the potentialities simmering within the world as it is following gilles deleuze call to transform belief prewitt davis explores how belief heightens an affective attachment to our embeddedness on the world revealing the potentialities with which time is always pregnant believing in the world as it is paradoxically becomes the mode of transforming the world inasmuch as the potential for something impossibly new is always immanently present

one of the urgent tasks of modern philosophy is to find a path between the rationalism of the enlightenment and the relativism of postmodernism rationalism alone cannot suffice to solve today's problems but neither can we dispense with reasonable critique the task is to find ways to broaden the scope of rational thought without losing its critical power the first part of this volume explores the ideas of enlightenment philosophers and shows nuances often absent from the common view of the enlightenment the second part deals with some of the modern heirs of enlightenment such as durkheim habermas and derrida in the third part this volume looks at alternatives to enlightenment thought in west european russian and buddhist philosophy part four provides over against the enlightenment a new starting point for the philosophy of religion in thinking about human beings god and the description of phenomena

slavoj Žižek's critical engagement with christian theology goes much further than his seminal *The Fragile Absolute* 2000 or his *The Puppet and the Dwarf* 2003 or even his discussion with noted theologian john milbank in *The Monstrosity of Christ* 2009 his reading of christianity utilising his signature elements of lacanian psychoanalysis and hegelian philosophy with modern philosophical currents can be seen as a genuinely original contribution to the philosophy of religion this book focuses on these aspects of Žižek's thought with either philosophy and cultural theory or christian theology serving as starting points of enquiry written by a panel of international contributors each chapter teases out various strands of Žižek's thought concerning christianity and religion and brings them into a wider conversation about the nature of faith these essays show that far from being an outright rejection of christian thought and intellectual heritage Žižek's work could be seen as a perverse affirmation thereof thus what he has to say should be of direct interest to christian theology itself touching on thinkers such as badiou lacan chesterton and schelling this collection is a dynamic reading and re-reading of Žižek's relationship to christianity as such scholars of theology the philosophy of religion and Žižek more generally will all find this book to be of great interest

this study examines the dynamics of critical internet culture after the medium opened to a broader audience in the mid 1990s it is geert lovink s phd thesis submitted late 2002 written in between his two books on the same topic dark fiber 2002 and my first recession 2003 the core of the research consists of four case studies of non profit networks the amsterdam community provider the digital city dds the early years of the nettime mailinglist community a history of the european new media arts network syndicate and an analysis of the streaming media network xchange the research describes the search for sustainable community network models in a climate of hyper growth and increased tensions and conflict concerning moderation and ownership of online communities

in our contemporary post modern world popular forms of spirituality are increasingly engaging with notions of re enchantment of self and community drawing on case studies of particular groups including pagans witches radical faeries post modern tourists and queer and goddess groups contributors from australia the uk and north america discuss various forms of spirituality and how they contribute to self knowledge identity and community life the book documents an emerging engagement between new quasi religious groups and political action eco paganism post colonial youth culture and alternative health movements to explore how social change emerges

responses to the slovenian philosopher slavoj Žižek have been like Žižek himself extreme critics have accused him of charlatanism on the one hand while others have lauded his genius especially as a public intellectual on the other this makes it difficult to find any kind of nuanced or interesting critical appraisal of his work at its best Žižek s work provides a new foundation of dialectical philosophy beyond the glitz of stardom or oversimplified sinister disdain Žižek responds combines philosophers and theorists engaging with Žižek s philosophy in order to explore its unnoticed implications its conceptual problems or its unrealized potential with detailed and lively responses from Žižek himself this book offers an unique insight into how this thinker might explain clarify and hone some of his most

controversial and misunderstood ideas at once an introduction to Žižek's most important concepts and a rare and novel insight into his thoughts on the criticisms of his work this is indispensable reading for both Žižekians and their critics

ruf philosophy florida atlantic u and emeritus west virginia u explains to undergraduate students some of the ways philosophers have been trying to make sense of things over the past 150 years he analyzes criticizes selectively appropriates and reconstructs writings of existentialists social and cultural critics pragmatists and postmodernists in order to find a coherent interpretation of the current human form of life and its future possibilities

ideology draws on the social political and cultural theory of jurgen habermas gilles deleuze and slavoj zizek in order to explore the possibility of developing a critical conception of ideology the book is concerned with two main themes the relationship of ideology to the real and the relationship between ideology and the ethical although these three writers are often assumed to have little in common porter demonstrates a formal homology between them by showing that they all offer an idea of critique that pivots around two central intuitions firstly they insist that a substantive critical distinction can be drawn between the ideological and the real and secondly habermas deleuze and zizek all offer an image of ideology critique that is importantly grounded on ethical terms by engaging among other things with habermas's sociological work on the public sphere zizek's forays into popular culture and deleuze's analysis of political cinema ideology strives to concretely animate how each of these figures provide the critical tools necessary to challenge the kinds of ideological practice that pervade the contemporary social world

in Žižek's long awaited magnum opus he theorizes the parallax gap in the ontological the scientific and the political and rehabilitates dialectical materialism the parallax view is slavoj Žižek's most substantial theoretical work to appear in many years Žižek himself describes it as his magnum opus parallax can be defined as the apparent displacement of an object caused by a change in observational position Žižek is interested in the parallax gap separating two points between which no synthesis or mediation is possible linked by an impossible short circuit of levels that can never meet from this consideration of parallax Žižek begins a rehabilitation of dialectical materialism modes of parallax can be seen in different domains of today's theory from the wave particle duality in quantum physics to the parallax of the unconscious in freudian psychoanalysis between interpretations of the formation of the unconscious and theories of drives in the parallax view Žižek with his usual astonishing erudition focuses on three main modes of parallax the ontological difference the ultimate parallax that conditions our very access to reality the scientific parallax the irreducible gap between the phenomenal experience of reality and its scientific explanation which reaches its apogee in today's brain sciences according to which nobody is home in the skull just stacks of brain meat a condition Žižek calls the unbearable lightness of being no one and the political parallax the social antagonism that allows for no common ground between his discussions of these three modes Žižek offers interludes that deal with more specific topics including an ethical act in a novel by henry james and anti anti semitism the parallax view not only expands Žižek's lacanian hegelian approach to new domains notably cognitive brain sciences but also provides the systematic exposition of the conceptual framework that underlies his entire work philosophical and theological analysis detailed readings of literature cinema and music coexist with lively anecdotes and obscene jokes
