the purpose of the study was to study the relationship between the knowledge of the usefulness of the nursing care plan and the attitude of nurses toward the plan care planning process the independent variable involved attendance at an educational program which impacted on the dependent variable of attitude the hypothesis for the study was nurses who attend a nursing care planning process educational program would exhibit more positive attitudes regarding the usefulness of the nursing plan process than nurses who did not participate in the educational program thirty participants all possessing diploma school educations with one to six years registered nurse experience were chosen by accidental sampling fifteen attended an educational program and fifteen did not all completed a tool measuring attitude towards nursing care plans attitude tools were distributed and collected by a volunteer the t test findings indicated that there was no significant difference in attitude towards the nursing care planning process of those nurses who attended the educational program compared to those who did not therefore the hypothesis was rejected recommendations for further study include validating and testing reliability of tool studying various levels of educational groups randomization of sample population and securing demographic data of participants

the purpose of this study was to determine if a relationship exists between prejudice towards aids fear of contagion and level of knowledge and nurses attitudes toward aids additional analyses were carried out to determine if a relationship exists between attitudes toward aids and age sex marital status area and position of employment educational background and length of work experience of the nurses involved in the study a sample of 99 nurses out of 200 randomly selected from a pool of new york state nurses¹ association members responded to the invitation to participate in the study the instrument the questionnaire to identify nurses attitudes towards aids was developed by the investigator it was designed to address demographic information of the respondents his/her actual experience in caring for aids patients as well as measure respondents knowledge of aids level of concern when dealing with patients with the disease and attitude of nurses toward groups at risk for developing aids each participant's instrument had an overall mean attitude score on all 20 items computed as well as a mean score for the ten items related to knowledge of aids and the ten items related to attitude toward aids patients homosexuals and iv drug users analysis of variance was used to determine any variation of nurses attitude scores among the variables studied it is clear from this study that nurses attitudes toward aids are more positive than negative the theoretical position that nurses prejudice against the social groups at risk for developing aids is related to a more negative attitude toward caring for patients with aids was not supported by this investigation based on this finding two conclusions were drawn first nurses desire to uphold the ethical standards of the profession is stronger than their prejudicial attitude toward homosexuals and intravenous drug users second nurses increased contact with these groups and the availability of professional literature and workshops on drug abuse and homosexuality may help to dispel false stereotypes and therefore decrease the degree of prejudice felt by nurses it is also evident from this investigation that certain variables can affect nurses attitude toward aids fear of contagion has been shown to cause nurses attitudes to become more negative while knowledge and understanding about aids has been shown to cause nurses attitudes to become more positive no significant statistical relationship was found between nurses attitude and the following demographic variables age sex marital status current education area of employment position held number of years of nursing experience and number of aids patients cared for there was a significant relationship between the type of programs the participants graduated from and their attitude toward aids there was also a significant relationship between nurses who refused to care for aids patients and their attitude toward aids

background nurses belief systems cultural social and philosophical may influence their attitudes towards death nurses attitudes towards death may in turn effect the care they provide the dying peters et al 2013 sherwen 2014 in other words care of the dying may depend on the nurses feelings and ideas about death and dying their religious convictions and their philosophies of death and life billings engelberg curtis block sullivan 2010 ferrell virani grant coyne uman 2000 aim this study was conducted to establish if there is a relationship between nurses attitudes toward death and their communication comfort about end of life issues methods a link to the web based questionnaire was made available to the nurses to complete over a 12 week period the response rate was 19.9% n=225 the questionnaire consisted of the following demographic questions the intercultural palliative care communication comfort ipccc the spirituality and spiritual care rating scale sscr the spiritual health and life orientation measure shalom and the death attitude profile revised dap r data analyses included t test and one way analysis of variance anova results the nurse respondents characteristics such as religion age ethnicity education and spoken language were significantly related to attitudes towards death the nurses education and spoken language were significantly related to comfort with end of life communication nurses spirituality was significantly related to attitudes towards death the nurses spirituality was not significantly related to end of life communication comfort conclusion there is evidence of a relationship between nurses

attitudes toward death and their end of life communication comfort further research is required examining the role of a nurses ethnicity and the religiosity of the nurse in end of life communication comfort
