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hypertension is one of the leading causes of death in the united states affecting nearly one in three americans it is prevalent in adults and endemic in the older adult population hypertension is a major contributor to cardiovascular morbidity and disability although there is a simple test to diagnose hypertension and relatively inexpensive drugs to treat it the disease is often undiagnosed and uncontrolled a population based policy and systems change approach to the prevention and control hypertension identifies a small set of high priority areas in which public health officials can focus their efforts to accelerate progress in hypertension reduction and control it offers several recommendations that embody a population based approach grounded in the principles of measurement system change and accountability the recommendations are designed to shift current hypertension reduction strategies from an individual based approach to a population based approach they are also designed to improve the quality of care provided to individuals with hypertension and to strengthen the center for disease control and prevention s leadership in seeking a reduction in the sodium intake in the american diet to meet dietary guidelines the book is an important resource for federal public health officials and organizations especially the center for disease control and prevention as well as medical professionals and community health workers

in a world where social ecological health and other problems are influenced by multiple intersecting systems why do most interventions target single factor solutions why does so much evaluation settle for incremental change and how could it contribute instead to deeper lasting transformative change authors emily f gates and pablo vidueira make two interconnected arguments in this book they critique the fixed approach of traditional program evaluation and policy analysis and they advance an alternative approach centered on changing systems and developing the value of efforts toward change they demonstrate that systemic change that embeds evaluative inquiry is a theoretically supported practical way to work toward fundamental social change with lasting impact

these studies cover a range of topics market reforms social justice ecology nationalism new political parties and more that are at the centre of the revolutionary changes under way in the former soviet bloc the breadth of this book s subject matter is complemented by the variety of methods and approaches that it features historical interpretation linguist analysis statistical analysis and political sociology the result is a genuinely inter disciplinary treatment of this important topic

in a world of increasing complexity instant information availability and constant flux systems approaches provide the opportunity of a tangible anchor of purpose and iterate learning the five approaches outlined in the book offer a range of interchangeable tools with rigorous frameworks of application tried and tested in the real world the frameworks of each approach form a powerful toolkit to explore the dynamics of how societies emerge how organisations create viability how to facilitate chains of argument through causal mapping how to embrace a multiplicity of perspectives identifying purposeful activity and how to look for the bigger picture across

multiple disciplines systems approaches offers an excellent first introduction for those seeking to understand what systems thinking is all about as well as why the tools discussed herein should be applied to management and professional practice this book provides a practical guide and the chapters stand alone in explaining and developing each approach
